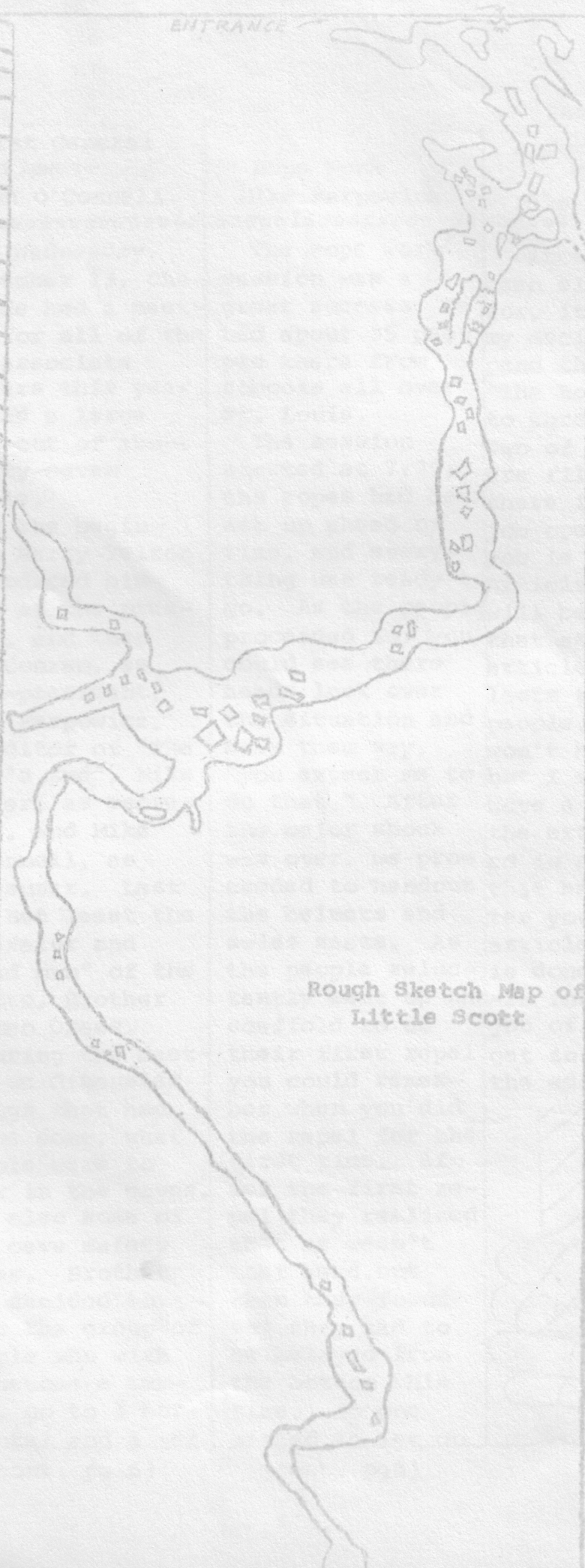

The rope work session was a great success. We had about 35 people there from schools all over St. Louis.

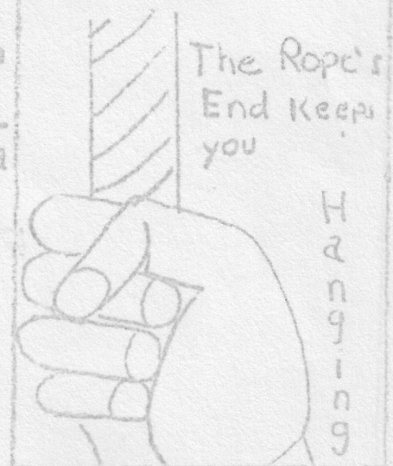

Caving & camping, canoesing, ropework, and back packing as related to caves.

Cave Safety...common sense...nothing beyond your strength...stay with group...never run or jump...3 sources of light

Cave Conservation... "Take nothing but pictures leave nothing but footprints." ...Never mark walls...Never break formations or take broken ones from floor.

...Plastic bag for carbide (poison)...Take out lunch bags

First Trip: Sept. 17th. 8:30am-7:00pm (Mass for Catholics 5:00pm Sat.)

Equipment Needed (for first trip).

1) Complete change of clothes, including underwear and shoes.

2) Packed lunch (small to carry)

3) Wear sturdy old clothes...gloves (leather or garden)

4) Hard Hat with Carbide Lamp, borrowed if possible

Wear boots (NOT TENNIS SHOES)

5) Acceptable light for now: flashlight & extra batteries; candles; matches

6) Acceptable head protection for now motorcycle and football helmets

7) later on--canteen, army belt, side or shoulder pack, duffie bag.

Grotto store: Hard Hats with lamp attachment; chin strap (in 2 weeks)

Carbide lamps (bross from England)... (in 2 months)

(Alsams rubber boots are cheapest...Not in Grotto store)

Army boots are best...Jungle or desert boots
